

## West Point Foundry Preserve & Foundry Dock Park History Quest

West Point Foundry Preserve and Foundry Dock Park in Cold Spring are great places to explore and learn more about the Hudson Valley's history. In celebration of Presidents' Day, we've created an educational challenge at these parks (which are connected by a universally accessible trail along Foundry Cove Marsh). While enjoying the natural beauty of these special places, find the answers to the following questions by reading the interpretive panels or logging onto our exciting interactive mobile tour at **foundrytour.org**. Please remember to stay on marked paths at West Point Foundry Preserve: It's a sensitive archaeological site and it's important to leave things as you find them.

PLEASE NOTE: There is no snow removal at West Point Foundry Preserve's parking area. Under snowy conditions, visitors should park at Cold Spring's Metro-North station and take the pedestrian overpass to the preserve entrance, located at the south end of the northbound platform.

- 5. What's the name of the cannon produced at West Point Foundry that's credited with helping to win the Civil War?
  - a. Parrott gun
- 6. What's the name of the mountain range surrounding Cold Spring?
  - a. Hudson Highlands
- 7. What natural feature provided power for West Point Foundry's machines?
  - a. Foundry Brook
- 8. What's the name of the foundry building where holes were drilled into cannons?
  - a. Boring Mill
- 9. What other products were produced at the foundry?
  - a. Locomotives/steam engines/pipes for New York City's water system/ building facades/furniture
- **10.** What type of contamination from the adjacent battery factory was cleaned up in Foundry Cove Marsh?
  - a. Heavy metal/cadmium
